Larry's Log,

Memories...We use to fly at the abandoned North-South runway at the Belgrade airport. It was great, we had about 400 feet of blacktop runway 60 feet wide. And airport maintenance took care of any patching and plowing that needed to be done. It was built during WWII for pilot training. Current club members had a key to get through the cyclone fence. This was prior to 911.

Sometime around the fall of 1989, a beginning pilot was flying his gas-powered trainer and the plane got away from him. He reported seeing it climbing away in large circles heading for the Bridger mountains. We figured that would be the last we saw of it. In the spring, a rancher near Wilsaw saw his cattle huddled around something in his field. He went over to investigate and found an RC airplane laying upright in the field. It must of a had a smooth landing, no damage!! At that time Bozeman actually had a *real* hobby shop on east Main Street. The rancher brought in the plane and the pilot got his plane back. What a trip across the Bridgers to Wilsaw about 20 miles away.

As Paul Harvey use to say, "and now for the rest of the story". Sometime in the early 1990's, a pilot crashed his RC airplane in the airport area. A Delta pilot reported to the tower that the RC pilot could find his crashed airplane between the taxiway and the active runway. Well... that was the end of flying at the airport. We were lucky the RC plane didn't damage the full-size airplane or hurt people. The abandoned runway was great while it lasted.

After a false start, I got my electric U Can Do 3 D flying. This uses an old wing and tail group with a scratch-built fuselage. It flies just as well as the gas-powered plane does. I'm using a BL50 motor with a 70-amp ESC and 6 cell 5000maH brick battery. It is the same weight as the gas-powered plane with 10 ounces of gas.



I used Velcro to secure the battery inside the fuselage. A new tool was needed to get the battery in and out of the plane. This sheet metal plate slides between the Velcro halves splits the Velcro and allows the battery to be positioned correctly and removed.
